Born: 1912

George Kotlarek was born in Duluth, Minnesota, in 1912 and began to ski jump when just a youngster. By the time he was eleven, he was topping many of the senior class club members.

George Kotlarek coached jumpers most of his adult life, and he served as an officer of the Duluth Ski Club for many years. George is listed among the Greats of American skiing," and was chosen by the National Ski Association Historian, as a member of the Modern All American Ski Squad.

George Stanley Kotlarek, a member of the Duluth Ski Club, engaged in ski jumping competitions for more than 30 years.

He started his career as a ski jumping competitor on a local level at Duluth, Minnesota, at 11 years of age and was topping many of the senior club members.

In his long period of competition, he earned a progressive record unequaled by any other competitor on a national level as the winner of titles in the Class "D," "C," "A," and Veterans events. He missed the honor of competing for the NSA Class "B" event due to winning the CUSSA Class "B" championship which elevated him into the Class "A" group.

In his long career as a competitor, he maintained a high rating as an amateur sportsman and is above reproach from the character standpoint. He served his local club well as an officer and director, and served as vice president of the Duluth Ski Club.

Named to the 1944 All-America Modern Ski Squad picked by the Historian of the National Ski Association, George Kotlarek was described as "Duluth's skiing ace since he was 11 years old, piled up a remarkable record to place in the first five great modern skiing aces with three national titles, two divisional titles and 15 first places." To become listed among the "greats in American Skiing," Kotlarek had won the National Class "A" jumping





championship of 1936 at Red Wing, Minnesota, the National Class "C" championship in 1928 at Red Wing, and the

National Boys' title in 1927 at Denver, Colorado. Following world War II, Kotlarek captured three National Veterans' Championships: 1948 at Seattle, Washington; 1950 at Duluth, and 1954 at Ishpeming, Michigan. Always rated a great and courageous competitor, Kotlarek also has coached ski jumpers and is the father of Gene Kotlarek, National Class "A" champion of 1963 and Olympian of 1960 and 1964. His nomination was proposed in 1963 by the late Harold Grinden, NSA life-time historian and former head of the U.S. National Ski Hall of Fame.

George Stanley Kotlarek was elected to the U.S. National Ski Hall of Fame in Ishpeming, Michigan, in 1968.
