KRISTEAN PORTER

As a pioneer of her sport and one of freestyle skiing's greatest athletes, Sugarloaf skier Kriste Porter enjoyed a stellar career as a member of the U.S. Freestyle Ski Team. An aerialist and combined skier in the mid-90s, Porter dominated her as a World Champion and a two-time overall World Cup titlist.

In an era today of specialization, it's hard to imagine the success of an individual athlete like Porter. While she excelled in aerials, she was among the best in the world in acro or ballet skiing, and a regular top finisher in moguls skiing. Which made her one of the top overall favorites on the World Cup every season.

Porter made her World Cup debut in Dec., 1989 and took just a month to score her first World Cup podium – at Lake Placid. A year later she picked up the first of four World Championship medal, taking bronze in aerials – again, at Lake Placid. Over the next four seasons she was one of the strongest overall freestyle skiers in the world, skiing in both aerials and acro and picking up 29 podiums with six wins.

Her gold in combined at the 1995 World Championships highlighted her further on the world stage. But it was her back-to-back overall titles in the grueling season-long World Cup circuit that most made her proud.

Today, Porter lives in New Mexico where she just completed her OBGYN residency. She is married to Olympic luger Chris Thorpe is the mother of two young girls.
