State why the candidate merits election to the U.S. National Ski & Snowboard Hall of Fame (limit this statement to 250 words):

A quiet, unassuming athlete, who was most comfortable throwing a fly or carrying a bow into the backcountry, Johnny Spillane made an historical mark on his sport of nordic combined winning a World Championship title and becoming one of American skiing's most decorated Olympic athletes with three medals.

Spillane grew up in Ski Town U.S.A - Steamboat Springs, Colo. Like most kids in Steamboat, he was on skis as a child and became passionate about ski jumping and cross country. During his teen years, nordic combined became a rising force in Steamboat Springs under the leadership of U.S. Ski Team coach Tom Steitz, with both Steamboat-born athletes and others coming to the mountain town to train.

Spillane, just 18, was part of a strong team that broke through with a FIS Nordic Junior World Championships team event gold medal in 1999. They teamed up again a year later to take silver.

As the team bridged up to the World Cup tour, Spillane scored a stunning gold medal at the 2003 World Championships in Italy - putting the Americans on the map and foreshadowing what was to come over the next seven years. Suddenly the entire team was elevated with Spillane's success.

Coming into the 2010 Olympics, few could have anticipated the outcome. Spillane opened with silver in the normal hill competition - the first ever nordic combined medal for the USA. He joined teammates for silver in the team event and capped off the Olympics taking silver behind teammate Bill Demong - four nordic combined medals for Team USA.

Johnny Spillane wasn't just a part of history, he was the pacesetter. His quiet work ethic and ability to engage with his teammates brought unprecedented success for himself and his team.

This letter is written in support of Johnny Spillane being nominated and inducted into the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame, because of his success as a nordic combined skier over the period of time from 1997-2013.

Johnny was a member of the most successful nordic combined teams that the United States has ever developed. He and his teammates were major players in the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Teams being best in the world in the 2010 Winter Olympics. The Nordic Combined Team won four medals in those games and Johnny won two silver individual medals and one silver in a team relay, clearly an amazing performance. In addition, he won a gold medal in the 2003 World Championships, the first gold medal in nordic skiing by an American. That performance was an indication of what he would achieve and what the nordic combined team would achieve over the next decade.

Johnny's career is one that demonstrates the total commitment necessary to be best in the world. He and his teammates began their careers together as youngsters and followed a plan that had been laid out by their coach Tom Steitz. His vision took almost 15 years before it came to fruition but because of youngsters like Johnny Spillane and Johnny's pursuit of a dream the vision became a reality. Success is defined as doing the right things over a long period of time and I think that there is no better example of success than what Johnny has accomplished in his career.

He continues to be active in nordic skiing as a TV commentator and his experience and enthusiasm make nordic combined fun and interesting for fans, parents, and youngsters.

For all that Johnny Spillane has done and what his efforts have meant to so many, I wholeheartedly support his nomination and election into the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame.

It is an honor for me to recommend Johnny Spillane for induction into the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame, and I do so wholeheartedly as someone who had the high privilege of covering the entirety of his career.

As the longtime skiing and Olympics writer for the Denver Post, I covered U.S. nordic combined closely for more than 20 years, and I was there for all three of Johnny's Olympics. I closely followed and wrote about his achievements at world championships in Europe from my desk in Denver. I recall well the day in Vancouver when he became the first American to win an Olympic medal in nordic combined.

People wept for joy that day, including the vice president of athletics for the U.S. Ski Team, and I probably shed a few tears as well because I had witnessed the full sweep of U.S. nordic combined from worst in the world to best, getting to know everyone involved very well through my proximity to the program. The performance of that team in Vancouver ranks as one of the best memories I carry from the seven Winter Olympics I was blessed to cover.

I also recall Johnny being calm, composed and soft-spoken that day. He not only was a great athlete who made Olympic history for the U.S. -- and at the world championships, for that matter -- but he is a man of humility and character who represented his sport and Olympic ideals as well as anyone I have covered as an Olympics writer. This is a man, after all, who competed at the 2006 Olympics with a separated shoulder.

He also was the embodiment of his hometown, Steamboat Springs, which we in Colorado proudly call Ski Town USA. This is a man who saved the life of his brother in a hunting accident, which he was able to do because of the fitness and coolness under pressure that made him such a successful athlete.

You are certainly aware that he was the first American to claim world championships gold in a nordic sport, and that he was the first American to win an Olympic medal in nordic combined. But it's crucial to remember that he played a key role in U.S. nordic combined going from worst to best which culminated in Vancouver, raising the profile of an obscure but beautiful ski discipline that deserves to be more appreciated in America's ski culture than it is.

I urge you to make him a member of the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame because he richly deserves it.
